

#23 Disinformation: Editor's Statement


In keeping with the idea that each issue of **PhotoStatic Magazine** ought to have an immediate and temporary feel, the theme **Disinformation** was chosen to interact with the current social and political environment. Relatively few submissions directly intended for the theme were actually received and so, as usual, much of the work orbits the theme without teleporting to the surface. This should not be a source of disappointment, however, as the focus of any issue of **PhotoStatic** must of necessity be somewhat diffuse, due to the varied interests of contributors coming from a wide variety of disciplines. The editor prefers to put more effort into seeing to it that the issues are of a consistent level of quality, so that each issue of the series augments all the previous installments. It is hoped that the reader/ participant will agree.

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Fundamentalists win textbook lawsuit GREENEVILLE, Tenn. (AP) -

Seven families who filed suit contending their children's textbooks contained themes offensive to their strict Christian beliefs won their case today.

A federal judge said the families are entitled to damages from the Hawkins County school board because the district's insistance on using the Holt, Rinehart, Winston series of reading books violated their First Amendment rights.

one of the parents and the leading witness in the trial.

"It's a wonderful victory. We're ecstatic," said Michael Farris, who represented the parents.

Timothy Dyk, a lawyer for the school system, would not comment until he had time to read the decision. said his secretary. Both sides had promised to appeal an adverse ruling.

The families sued the Hawkins County schools in 1983 after objecting to hundreds of passages in the readers, including stories by Margaret Meade, Isaac Asimov and Danish fairy-tale writer Hans Christian Andersen.

The parents said the books contained references to witchcraft, exotic religions, one-world government and relative ethics, all of which violate their Christian beliefs.

We talked some more about "need" versus "want," which turned out to be quite instructive for both of us.


"Also," I noted, "if you had a job that paid as much as \$10 per hour, you would have had to work nine and a half hours to buy that shirt,"

"I agree. In fact, if you recall, at the end of the show the other kids were admiring Cosby's son for being original and having his sister make a shirt.



Our first attempts to "eavesdrop on the dreaming brain" produced results so unintelligible that they were not recognized as successful until we finally understood that the brain, constantly remembering images at hazard, is equally unguided in comparing those with its short-term memory; and the chance congruence of long-term and short-term memory images creates a feedback loop (called at first an Ur-habit).

Refined (abstracted, simplified) by the loop, it inevitably becomes an unreferenced or "free" sign, made manageable by its limitations. This "idiot's noise" is embossed over any fairly similar sign and the result, with its new wrinkles, is read as a variation of the old one.

Any given designations are thereby made amenable to being part of one of the various patterns (motifs) called protonarratives; those, in turn, inform what habitual "true narratives" the individual finds imaginable (or "evocable"). Thus, what we remember and dutifully report as dreams to our priests and/or psychiatrists were second- or third-hand reports, and the difference between them and lies was more or less an index of the society's need for gratuitous control.

The most difficult problem of all was to make the "nihilism" of the proposition acceptable when it became clear that the only important mental difference between the waking and sleeping state was the relative importance of the skandhas, the sense-data interference.

American Living #19 (5.5x8.5in. xerox 40pp.) #20 (36pp.)

Both of these examples of American Living are literally edge to edge with collage imagery, with source material coming from elementary science books, steelpoint engravings, drawings, etc. Rather similar to Kansas College of Collage stuff. Sort of Max Ernst meets the Marx Brothers but it doesn't make that much sense. They kind of strike me like those Slavko Vorkapich montages from Hollywood movies where they let him crossfade between several different picture sources to create an asyntactic mélange of loaded juxtapositions & the effect, sans context as here, is dreamlike.

La Poire d'Angoisse #119 (15x21cm xerox 40pp)



More from Mike Miskowski's B. S. Propaganda, where MaLLife comes from. All in all, a very nicely put together collection of tastefully typeset and concrete poetry with b/w visuals. The notion of 'wasteside development' is interesting in that it suggests something made out of little or nothing, and it points to the resourcefulness of the artists & poets who do this kind of work. Primera Bienal Internacional de Poésia Visual y Experimental en México 1985-1986 (8.5x8.5in. offset 72pp.)


A sizeable and comprehensive collection of b/w v/v work. The quality and variety here is stupendous, and I recognized many familiar names from all over the network, as well as many new ones. It's interesting to note that there is also a lot of work from Eastern Europe represented too, as well as from all over the world. Obviously the focus is on concrete poetry, which seems to have evolved over the years into a sort of hybrid medium with xerage (Miekal And points this out in issues of Xerolage). From my experience, the networks of poetry and xerox work are inextricably entwined & therefore so are their futures. This crossflux of disciplines (or undisciplineds) gives the hybrid medium an unmatched vitality today. There is evidence for all this in this volume, and I'd encourage you to get one. 
Stigmata Junction by Thomas Wiloch (6x8.25in. xerox 36pp.)

Collection of poems put next to surreal collages à la Max Ernst. The poems do a good job of getting the sense of the collages, or vice versa. They both are enigmatic little stories which aren't so enigmatic when you think about them. The poems are more successful in this regard than the images. A really interesting idea for a project. This is a daily magazine which features in each issue the work of a single artist. The mechanics of the project are like this: editor Didier Moulinier (see La Poire d'Angoisse) sends out preprinted layout forms to folks, asking their participation in the form of filling the form with their work as well as a bit of information about themself. Moulinier takes on the tasks of production and distribution. Voilà — instant magazine. Because of their size, each one of them becomes a tantalizing glimpse; it's not possible to say a lot here, so much is left unsaid. Ourang-Outang by DeVillo Sloan (5.5x8.5in. xerox 28pp.)

"This wordless, destructive symbol of the irrational is a fitting emblem for this collection." Also "pieces attempt to dislocate language from signification and return the letter to its original function as hierolglyph" &c, &c. In this book, the text and images seem to have a mutual pact of inscrutability; any interpretation of them seems useless in the face of "The opiate makes/ picture writing on the iguana." Actually I am much more interested in Sloan's work with Ruth Showalter in —

Alloy by Ruth Showalter and DeVillo Sloan (5.5x8.5in. xerox 36pp.)

One of the premises of this book is that rationalism and how language is rooted in that is the cause of much of the world's ills, especially as "repressive chains of the fetid, corrupt language of COMMERCE..." By doing away with those constructs, Sloan/Showalter hope to renew language and thus people's imaginations. What I see is page after page of information that is essentially nonlinguistic in that it is an imagistic exploration of the possibilities of xeromanipulation of text-ures. It is recombinant in that bits of other text-ures drop in or are obscured & it is a very complete full visual-field effect. Ourang-Outang is \$2.50 from B. S. Props, P.O. 

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

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
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
